Greeting Friends & Neighbors,

The sun was bright, the sky was a soft pale blue, and there was a light cool breeze that smelled so sweet blowing gently through the trees. A hummingbird flew to a feeder I had hanging from a nearby tree. It hovered there for a moment, its tiny wings a blur, took a drink of nectar, and then zipped off to a rose of sharon bush across the yard. A squirrel scampered across the top of the stockade fence to a neighbor's pecan tree to retrieve a nut from an upper branch. As the squirrel made its way back down the tree and onto the fence with a pecan in its mouth, another hummingbird, this one with green tail feathers, found the feeder and began to partake. Everything seemed so tranquil, I just sat there and soaked it all in. My utopia was shattered a short time later when I went in and turned the TV to the national news. Chicago had just had its three thousandth homicide for the year. DEA agents had seized several hundred pounds of drugs in the Los Angeles area. Terrorist bombs had exploded in New York and New Jersey injuring several dozen people. The whole country seemed to be "going to hell in a hand basket". As I sat there I thought, how different our perception of how things are, depending on the information and its sources, we base our analysis on. Now, I realize that nothing is ever all good or all bad, and maybe that's what gives us hope.

Del City Bulk Waste Program

The City of Del City approved a bulk waste collection program for residential customers. This system replaces the collection days at the John Smith Ball Park. The funding for the Bulk Waste program is collected monthly by a two dollar (\$2.00) increase in sanitation services for residential accounts. We have contracted with Waste Management to handle the program, which occurs twice a year (spring and fall). The next event begins the week of **October 31, 2016**.

Bulk Waste Set Out Procedures:

- Items should be set out at least five (5) feet from mailboxes, gas meters, cars, shrubs, trees, signs or anything else that could interfere with the mechanical lifting arm.
- Items should be set out at least ten (10) feet away from utility poles, to prevent contact with overhead power lines.
- Place your Bulk Waste **at the curb no earlier** than Thursday, October 26th, but **no later** than 6 a.m. on Monday, October 31st.
- Small or loose items (such as clothes and toys) must be boxed up or placed in trash bags to be picked up.

Waste Management picks up no more than four (4) cubic yards of bulk waste (**about the size of two refrigerators**) each collection event. The bulk waste service is for Residential Customers only. Commercial businesses are not included in the bulk waste program. Waste Management makes **one (1) pass** through the City on each event. They use two (2) types of collection trucks—meaning, it is possible for your neighbor to be serviced on one day and your home on another day during the collection week.

They **WILL** pick up:

- Cardboard Boxes – broken down and tied into tight bundles
- Carpets
- Fencing
- Furniture
- Large and small household appliances
- Mattresses
- Non-contracted remodeling waste (do-it-yourself projects)
- Trees and Limbs

They **WILL NOT** pick up:

- Acids and Caustics
- Antifreeze
- Automobile Frames
- Brake Fluid
- Bricks, Dirt, Rocks, and Concrete
- Car Battery
- Contractor Construction/Reconstruction/Demolition
- Contractor Tree and Grass Trimmings
- Crankcases or Transmissions
- Degreasers
- Explosives
- Fertilizer
- Gasoline, Kerosene and Other Fuels
- Hospital/Medical Waste
- Lubricants
- Nuclear Materials
- Oils
- Pesticide
- Poisons
- Pool Chemicals
- Propane Tanks
- Repair Waste
- Rust Remover
- Sewage and Liquid Waste
- Sheetrock or Roofing Items
- Tires and Rims

Waste Management will only pick up four (4) cubic yards. Excess material must be removed from the curb by Saturday, November 6th. Residents can make arrangements with the Sanitation Division to have the material picked up at an additional charge by calling 671-2873.
